

Along with the St. Louis Festival, Becky was the recipient of the 2010 ORACLE award for leadership and service. In addition, Becky received the 2008 MAACCE (Missouri Association of Adult, Community and Continuing Education) Special Achievement Award for leadership and contributions to the St. Louis Festival.

Following retirement in 2014, Becky enjoys various activities including travel and spending winter months in Florida. Favorite hobbies: listening to a really good story, reading, spending time at the lake and an occasional game of golf.

Brian "Fox" Ellis is an internationally acclaimed author, storyteller, historian, and naturalist. He has worked with the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum, the Field Museum and dozens of other museums across the country.

Fox is a highly sought keynote speaker at regional and international conferences including the International Wetlands Conservation Conference, National Science Teachers Association Conference and the North American Prairie Conservation Conference.

Fox is also the Artistic Director for Prairie Folklore Theatre, a unique theatre company that celebrates ecology and history through original musical theatre productions.

He is the author of 16 books including the critically acclaimed Learning from the Land: Teaching Ecology Through Stories and Activities, the award-winning children's picture book, The Web at Dragonfly Pond, and Content Area Reading, Writing and Storytelling. Many of his stories are also available on one of 12 CDs. He will have a selection of his works for sale at the workshop. He and his wife run a bed and breakfast in Bishop Hill, Illinois, "The Twinflower Inn".

Our workshop will be held at the relaxing King's House Retreat Center.



All rooms are private single rooms that are attractive and clean, with their own bath, shower and thermostat. Personal essentials, such as towels & soap, are provided but you will need to provide extras such as hair dryer and shampoo.

The center is fully handicapped accessible. If you need a handicap room or a room with a shower safety bar, indicate that need on your registration form.

The goal of this workshop is to help you bring to life the characters you connect with and tell their stories in a powerful performance. As a large group we will discuss finding characters that fit, what draws us to a historical or religious figure, and the psychological act of stepping into character. We will work with a few theatre techniques that will allow us to physically step into character. We will discuss primary versus secondary source material and the process of turning research into performance material. With a journal excerpt in hand each will discuss with a partner how they might interpret the sample material. In small groups of four they will discuss their target audience and brainstorm marketing strategies. Fox will demonstrate several clothing choices and give each the opportunity to design their costume and make-up. We will end with a discussion of accuracy and aesthetics in historical interpretation.



#### Workshop Schedule

Friday Feb. 22: Arrive in time for check-in and group dinner at 6:00 P.M. followed by workshop introductions and story-sharing.

#### Saturday morning & afternoon workshop

Objectives: Participants will learn tips and tricks for creating believable characters thru costuming, physical characteristics and body language. We will discuss research and script development and how to turn letters and diaries into storytelling material.

#### Saturday evening story concert

We will have a private story concert presented by and for the attendees. This is a time to share and to experience newly gained skills in a nonjudgmental environment.

If more time is needed to complete the afternoon workshop, it will be done in lieu of a concert.

#### Sunday morning Spiritual Telling: 10:00 a.m.

Time for walking the labyrinth, sharing stories of a spiritual nature, or free time for you to explore other pursuits.

#### Sunday afternoon, 1:30 p.m. Workshop participants will present a Free Story Concert for family & friends:

This will be a free concert of storytelling by Brian Fox Ellis *and* workshop participants. Your family and friends are invited to come enjoy the show.



We invite you to the new Virtual Storytelling Guild sponsored and hosted by Northeast Storytelling. The entire guild is online and we hope that it will include participants from all over the US and the World. We can all learn from each other! We are storytellers who are interested in sharing stories, learning about storytelling, and enjoying peer feedback. We welcome tellers of traditional tales, historical stories, personal stories, stories with music, stories with puppets, rhymed stories, improv stories, crankies, and more. We invite you to sign in individually or to invite friends to join you for a storytelling party. Join us to tell a story, to discuss story techniques, etc. or just to listen to some great tales.

Our schedule as we begin this Guild includes slots for five tellers, plus extra places for our "in the wings" tellers. Each teller with a reserved spot will be assigned a 15-minute slot, which will typically look like this:

First teller (15 minutes): Story 10 min - Optional Peer feedback and discussion 5 min

If the teller does not wish feedback, we will move on to the next teller. One 20 minute slot will be available by request and however many five-ten minute slots we have time for.

It will be important for tellers who wish to reserve a slot to email one of the coordinators in advance to let us know to hold you a place. We will sign up the slots in the order in which we receive requests. If you wish to be on the waiting list, we will accept tellers to fill whatever time we have.

For each meeting there will be a challenge subject to use for inspiration in selecting a tale you wish to tell. Stories not related to the challenge topic or works in progress will be welcomed as well.

In the first two meetings, we will be trying out several different time frames. The most popular slot and the agreed procedures will be decided by the group members. We expect the initial meetings to be for two hours via ZOOM video conference. If you wish to be part of one (or both) of the trial groups, please email Hope Lewis and/or Cris Riedel directly by December 1st, 2018. You can join us at the last minute, of course, but it would be helpful for us to have your name and email address.
